ONS member Mary E. Cooley, RN, PhD, has been jointly appointed as nurse scientist and assistant professor within Dana-Farber Cancer Institute's Phyllis F. Cantor Center for Research in Nursing and Patient Care Services and the University of Massachusetts (UMass) Boston School of Nursing and Health Sciences.



Cooley has practiced as a clinician, educator, and researcher in oncology for 25 years. In her new role, Cooley will grow her program of research at Dana-Farber and will teach doctoral nursing students in the accelerated Bachelor of Science-to-PhD program at UMass Boston. The program, which began admitting students in 2007, is co-directed by the College of Nursing and Health Sciences and the Dana-Farber/Harvard Cancer Center. The curriculum focuses on cancer care and health disparities.

"As we continue to advance our joint program, top notch faculty recruitment is the key element for assuring excellence," says Patricia Reid Ponte, RN, DNSc, FAAN, NEA-BC, Dana-Farber's senior vice president for Patient Care Services and chief nurse.

Reel Lives: The Cancer Chronicles Film Festival Awards Prizes to Top Filmmakers

Chrigu from Switzerland has been awarded the grand prize in the first Reel Lives: Cancer Chronicles Film Festival at a ceremony in Geneva, Switzerland. Runner-up prizes also were awarded to *The Truth About Cancer* (United States) for best reportage, *The Art of Living* (India) for best personal story, *The Children of Avenir* (Morocco) for best organizational film, and *Hookah* (Israel) for the best public service announcement.

Award winners were chosen from an impressive lineup of 33 finalists from 16 countries. More than 250 films were entered into the competition.

"We are delighted to celebrate the achievements of these outstanding documentary filmmakers. Not only are they innovative and notable artists, they have all been touched by cancer in some way," commented Ann Steyn, chair of the festival jury.

Grand prize winner *Chrigu* tells the story of a young man who once had great plans for the future until, at the age of 21, an advanced-stage tumor was discovered in his neck. Director Jan Gassmann follows

Christian Ziörjen's fight to live and creates a moving and surprising portrait of his best friend.

Moffitt Cancer Center Named a 2008 Working Mother 100 Best Company

Working Mother magazine named Moffitt Cancer Center one of the 2008 *Working Mother* 100 Best Companies. From flextime and telecommuting to backup child care and parental leave, Moffitt is expanding the concept of family-friendly benefits to ensure they cover adoptive parents, fathers, and grandparents as well as working mothers. Moffitt is the only cancer center ever to be featured on the 22-year-old list.

"We're very proud that *Working Mother* magazine has recognized Moffitt as one of the nation's best places to work," said Yvette

Tremonti, vice president of Human Resources. "At Moffitt, we believe in making it a priority to recognize and support the needs of working parents. We are committed to providing the kind of benefits and employee-related programs that are important to our entire workforce."

Moffitt formed a working mother work group to address growing concerns felt by its own working mothers. Tremonti, a mother of four, is one of them. Her youngest child, four-year-old Michael, has Down Syndrome. She has depended on Moffitt to help her balance life as a professional and a mother of a child with special needs.

"My boss immediately asked what he could do for me," said Tremonti. "My husband and I decided right away that we wouldn't treat our son any differently. I knew I wanted to give him every possible opportunity. That meant I had to keep working to provide him with the best resources."

Moffitt promoted Tremonti to a senior executive position when her son was a year old. She and other working mothers shared their stories and helped to improve many of the current programs and create new ones.

Tremonti pointed to the hospital's on-site daycare center, its employee assistance program, and the tuition up-front program as examples of programs that address work and life needs of employees.

Moffitt was selected for the 2008 *Working Mother* 100 Best Companies based on an extensive application with more than 500 questions. The application included detailed questions about workforce, compensation, child care, flexibility programs, leave policies, and more. It also checked the usage, availability, and tracking of programs, as well as the accountability of managers who oversee them. Seven areas were measured and scored: workforce profile, compensation, child care, flexibility, time off and leaves, family-friendly programs, and company culture. For this year's 100 Best, particular weight was given to family-friendly policies, flexibility, leave policies, and benefits for part-timers.
